Nick is a Clinical Lecturer in Stroke Medicine at the University of Cambridge, and an Honorary Specialist Registrar in Geriatric Medicine at Addenbrooke's Hospital. His primary research focus is on imaging atherosclerosis using PET and MRI. In particular, considering how inflammation within atherosclerosis of the carotid arteries affects atherosclerotic plaque stability to cause a stroke, as well as how this inflammation affects the brain. Nick's clinical training has included rotations within hospitals across the east of England, and he has undertaken postgraduate training at the University of Dundee and Harvard Medical School. His PhD was supported by a Research Training

Fellowship from the Dunhill Medical Trust. His work has been awarded the Harvey Prize for Vascular Medicine, Binks Young Investigator Award, and a Quincentennial Lectureship, as well as awards from the BGS, Wellcome Trust, and British Heart Foundation.
