SPEAKERS BIOGRAPHIES

Prof James Barrett

Prof James Barrett iss a Consultant Physician, Wirral Hospital; and Professor of Healthcare of Older People, Liverpool John Moores University, British Geriatrics Society. His Special clinical interests are Stroke medicine, incontinence (especially bowels), memory loss, Parkinsons disease, rehabilitation, Alzheimers disease. His research interests are Incontinence, stroke, falls.

Prof Alan Cottenden

Alan Cottenden's multi-disciplinary work on technology for managing incontinence has included fundamental and applied physical and life sciences research through to translational work and product design and development. He chairs of the organising committee for the biennial Incontinence: the Engineering Challenge conference series run in London by the Institution of Mechanical Engineers. He contributed to all six of the International Consultations on Incontinence, (co)leading the team providing the chapter summarising evidence-based evidence for selecting incontinence products and using them effectively, and he codirects the ICS-based website that seeks to make this same advice accessible to products users at (www.continenceproductadvisor.org).

Ms Margaret Macaulay

Margaret Macaulay has been a urology nurse, clinical continence advisor and latterly a research nurse focusing on the development and delivery of continence management technologies. This includes evaluation of products and new product development, the provision of multi-media information for product users and HCPs, and tools for product selection. She is a member of the organising panel for the Institution of Mechanical Engineers conference, Incontinence: The Engineering Challenge, and is a member of the editorial team for the ICS-based website, the Continence Product Advisor (www.continenceproductadvisor.org) and more recently the Movember/ PCUK-funded website (https://www.continenceproductadvisor.org/advice/conditions/prostatecancer).

Ms Siobainn Bathgate

Siobainn Bathgate role within St Helens and Knowsley trust as a colorectal pelvic floor nurse specialist is an ever growing role. She works within a surgical team but when starting this role she realised that there were many other areas in the trust that we could branch out to. Her previous working experience was working on a care of the elderly ward and knew that bowel continence was an issue many patients having prolong stays in hospitals or issues with medication or products to assist with their problems. So started working with our frailty team within the trust. She regularly visit wards throughout the trust seeing a varied range of patients and hold three clinics a week to see new or follow up patients. She also try to educate staff and patients regarding, medication options, continence products, diet.

Ms Claire Downes

Claire Downes have worked in the NHS for 25 years and specialising in in and out patient obstetrics, gynaecology, urology and colorectal conditions for over 15 years. Currently, she is the clinical lead for the services run at St Helens and Knowsley NHS Hospitals trust and have set up GP direct access and percutaneous tibial nerve services as well as becoming an established member of the Multi-Disciplinary Team. She also offer out-patient physiotherapy at Fairfield Independent Hospital, is a Member of the Charted Society of Physiotherapy and an Associate Member of Pelvic Obstetric Gynaecology Physiotherapy special interest group.

Dr Vikky Morris

Vikky qualified in London in 1999, and began a career in care of older people medicine and acute general medicine. Her training was based in London in both teaching hospitals and district general hospitals allowing a very broad experience in medical care. She developed a special interest in urinary incontinence (urinating unintentionally) and in 2010 had the opportunity to spend a year doing research in the USA. She is particularly interested in patients who have urinary incontinence combined with other medical problems such as Parkinson's disease, dementia, heart failure and stroke

She joined Musgrove Park Hospital as a consultant in 2011 and really enjoy working on Wordsworth ward within the multi-disciplinary team at the hospital as well as the team at Dene Barton community Hospital. In addition to her general clinics, she runs a monthly continence clinic helping older patients which is based at Musgrove. She enjoys the holistic approach of older people care especially regarding acute admissions, falls and rehabilitation.

Mr Philip Toozs-Hobson

Philip Toozs-Hobson is a Consultant Gynaecologist and Honorary Reader at the University of Birmingham. He is Former Clinical Director of Gynaecology & Director of Pelvic floor Medicine at Birmingham Women's Health Care NHS Foundation Trust

Mr Dudley Robinson

Dudley Robinson trained at the Royal London Hospital qualifying in Medicine with MBBS in 1991. He was appointed as honorary senior lecturer at Kings College London in 2009 and as a fellow of the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists in 2010. He is President of the Royal Society of Medicine Obstetrics and Gynaecology Section. He is also a member of the International Continence Society (ICS), British Society of Colposcopy and Cervical Pathology (BSCCP), UK Continence Society (UKCS), British Society of Urogynaecology (BSUG) and International Urogynaecology Association (IUGA) and European Urogynaecology Association (EUGA). He is the past Scientific Chair of IUGA, Research Committee Chair of BSUG, Treasurer of UKCS and a member of the Educational Committee in EUGA.

In addition he has an active role teaching both undergraduates and post graduates. He regularly gives invited lectures both nationally and internationally and is a section editor of the European Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology and Reproductive Biology and on the editorial board of the International Urogynaecology Journal. He has published over 120 peer review papers, 90 published abstracts and 37 book chapters. In addition he has co-authored two books on urinary incontinence.

Dr Susy Orme

Susie Orme graduated with Honours from University of Nottingham in 1991. Whilst at Nottingham she developed an interest in Urinary incontinence. She has worked as a consultant geriatrician in Barnsley since 2000 and has an award winning continence service. She is an active member of the ICS, sat on clinical guidelines group for NICE and has published widely.
