Speakers

Dr Sarah Wilson

Dr Sarah Wilson is an Old-Age Liaison Psychiatrist working at the Queens Medical Centre in Nottingham. Her interests include Driving with Dementia and Cognitive Impairment, Parkinson's Disease and End of Life Care.

Dr Simon Thacker

Dr Simon Thacker is a Consultant Old Age Psychiatrist at the Liaison Team, Royal Derby Hospital and Clinical Director at Derbyshire Healthcare Trust. I spent 20 years working as an Inpatient and Community Psychiatrist for Older People before moving into Liaison Psychiatry 6 years ago. After decades of subconsciously avoiding alcohol problems, I am now immersed in drink and its ravages. Derby has some of the highest rates of alcohol-related admissions in England and older folk are increasingly contributing a large share. I will share my experiences on working with the Older (and often Cognitively-Impaired) Drinker whilst walking the tight-rope between mental health and acute medical services.

Dr Catherine Gordon

Catherine Gordon has been a consultant in Nottinghamshire for 17 years and has runs the Young Onset Dementia service with a colleague. She is a community psychiatrist and is currently involved in setting up an arts day centre in Broxtowe for people living with dementia. She is a member of the old age exec Royal College of Psychiatrists and was a PI for the ATLAS study that looked at paranoid disorders and treatment with amisulpiride.

Dr James Stewart

Dr James Stewart qualified from Leicester Medical School 1991 and trained in the East Midlands in Gastroenterology. He developed an interest in nutrition during this time and was appointed as a Consultant Gastroenterologist in 2001. He further developed his nutritional interest and became Clinical Lead for Adult Nutrition in 2006. Dr Stewart devised and wrote the national NCEPOD report on provision of parenteral nutrition and is a member of the BSG Nutrition Committee and BSG Clinical Services and Standards Committee. He is the Lead Physician to the Regional eating Disorders Service and his particular clinical interests are the provision of parenteral nutrition in intestinal failure and the management of electrolytes.

Prof Rowan Harwood

Rowan Harwood is Professor of palliative and end-of-life care in the University of Nottingham, and an Honorary Consultant Geriatrician at Queens Medical Centre. He has wide clinical and research interests including delirium, dementia, stroke, continence, rehabilitation, end of life care, falls and clinical ethics. He spent 10 years as a stroke physician. Since 2009 has worked to develop and evaluate better ways to manage cognitively impaired older people in general hospitals, and other dementia related research. He has written 4 books on stroke and dementia, and over 100 of his academic papers have been published in a wide variety of scientific journals. He is currently Editor of the journal Age and Ageing.
