Dr Peter Brock is currently a ST7 in geriatrics working in the North East. He recently completed a two year stint as the first Editorial Fellow for Age and Ageing. He also is the current chairman of the Association for Elderly Medicine Education (AEME) who are the team of geriatrics trainees behind Geriatrics for Juniors, Mini-GEMs and the CotEcast podcasts.

Dr Lucinda Baldwin

Having graduated from the University of Liverpool in 2006 I have spent my career so far in the Mersey Deanery. I have been Consultant Geriatrician at Aintree University Hospital since May 2017 and have a specialist interest in frailty and cognitive impairment. I am Clinical Lead for Frailty and Joint Trust lead for Delirium and Dementia.

Dr Francis Collin

Francis has been a Consultant Geriatrician in the North East for four years having trained in the South West and London. He works in an acute trust across the medical and surgical directorates and in community based settings. He has a Masters in Medical Education from Cardiff University. Outside of work he is an avid Frisbee player (winner of the Scottish Beach Championships (CUBE) 2018).

Dr Donald Milliken

As a consultant anaesthetist with an interest in prehabilitation, risk assessment and anaesthesia for major complex surgery, I am focused on achieving better outcomes for our increasingly frail, high-risk surgical patients. Specific interests include risk modelling, frailty and sarcopenia, remotely monitored prehabilitation and cardiopulmonary exercise testing.

Abstract: Age is not a barrier to intensive care but sharing decisions with older patients about intensive care admission and advanced organ support requires an understanding of the risks and an awareness of the outcomes. For older patients who are burdened by frailty and multi-morbidity, critical care may not offer a realistic chance of satisfactory outcomes. As we work to improve access to critical care for all patients who are likely to benefit, we must also work with patients to develop a shared understanding of the goals of critical care, as well as the adverse consequences and likely outcomes.

Dr Louise Southern

Louise trained as a geriatrician in the north-east of England and was recently appointed as a Stroke Consultant jointly across Newcastle-upon-Tyne and Gateshead. She leads the 'Clinical Research with Older People' module as part of Newcastle University's Clinical Sciences Online Masters programme, and also teaches undergraduates on topics including Medical Ethics and Shared Decision Making. Outside of work she parents, bakes and plays saxophone with varying degrees of enthusiasm and inexpertise. Abstract: This talk will discuss:

- stroke: what the medical registrar needs to know at 3am
- PEGs and polypharmacy: cerebrovascular disease treatment tailored to the frail elderly patient;
- cognitive effects of stroke: ethics and practicalities

Dr Lesley Young

Consultant Geriatrician Sunderland Royal Hospital Lesley qualified in Medicine from Newcastle University in 1989 and completed training in geriatric medicine in the northern region. She undertook a 2-year period of research on delirium, culminating in the publication by the Royal College of Physicians of the first national guidelines on the diagnosis and management of delirium. She was appointed as a consultant in Sunderland in 1999, being part time since 2002. Lesley is clinical lead for dementia and Mental Capacity at Sunderland and has developed an innovative delirium and dementia outreach team which identifies and advise on cognitive problems throughout the hospital.
