What is the RCP doing to improve care for the biggest user group of healthcare, older people?

Professor Mumtaz Patel, RCP President, consultant nephrologist at Manchester University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust and honorary professor at both the University of Liverpool and University of Manchester

Professor Mumtaz Patel was elected president of the RCP in 2025. She is a consultant nephrologist at Manchester University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust and honorary professor at both the University of Liverpool and University of Manchester. Mumtaz is the first fellow of South Asian heritage to lead the RCP in its 500-year history. Mumtaz studied medicine at the University of Manchester, qualifying in 1996, and completed her PhD in the genetics of lupus nephritis in 2006. She became a consultant in 2007 and completed her master's in medical education in 2014. Since then she has developed a national reputation in postgraduate education, assessment and training. Mumtaz has held a range of senior roles, including RCP senior censor and vice president for education and training (VPET), and RCP Global vice president. As VPET, she led the development of a new education strategy, and during her tenure as Global VP, she expanded international engagement and launched the RCP Global Women Leaders Programme.

Dr John Hindle has been a pillar of geriatric medicine in Wales for over three decades and has made a huge contribution to patient care, education and training.

He originally trained in psychiatry at St Mary's, Kings College and The Maudsley Hospitals in London. He completed training in medical specialties in Hull and higher medical training in Geriatric Medicine at St Georges Hospital. He was made a fellow of both the Royal College of Physicians and the Royal College of Psychiatrists.

He has over 35 years of clinical, management, teaching and research experience in Parkinson's disease. He was a founder member of the BGS Parkinson's disease special interest group.

His research into and publications on cognitive impairment and dementia are recognised internationally. His clinical teaching and lectures have inspired many geriatricians to specialise in Parkinson's.

In 2018 he was awarded the Marjory Warren Lifetime Achievement Award. This award is given to BGS members who have made exceptional contributions to the welfare of older people over the course of their careers.

He was awarded a Senior Doctorate (DSc) in 2019 for his work on the Neuropsychiatry of Parkinson's.

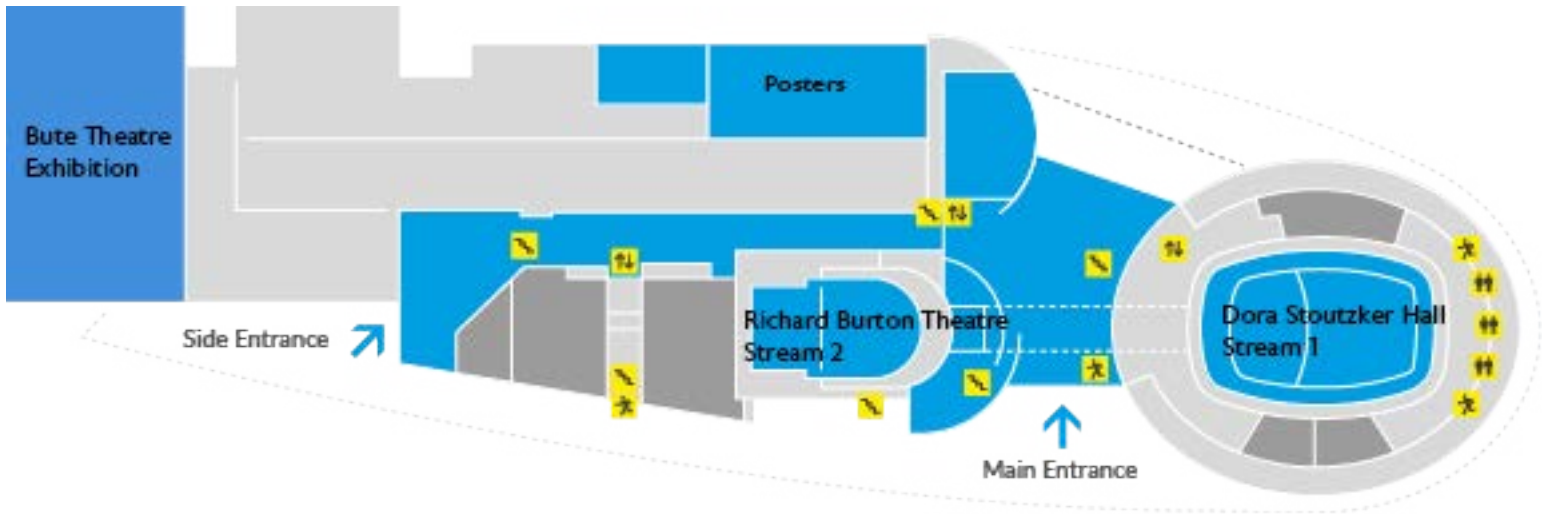

John is living with a diagnosis of Parkinson's.

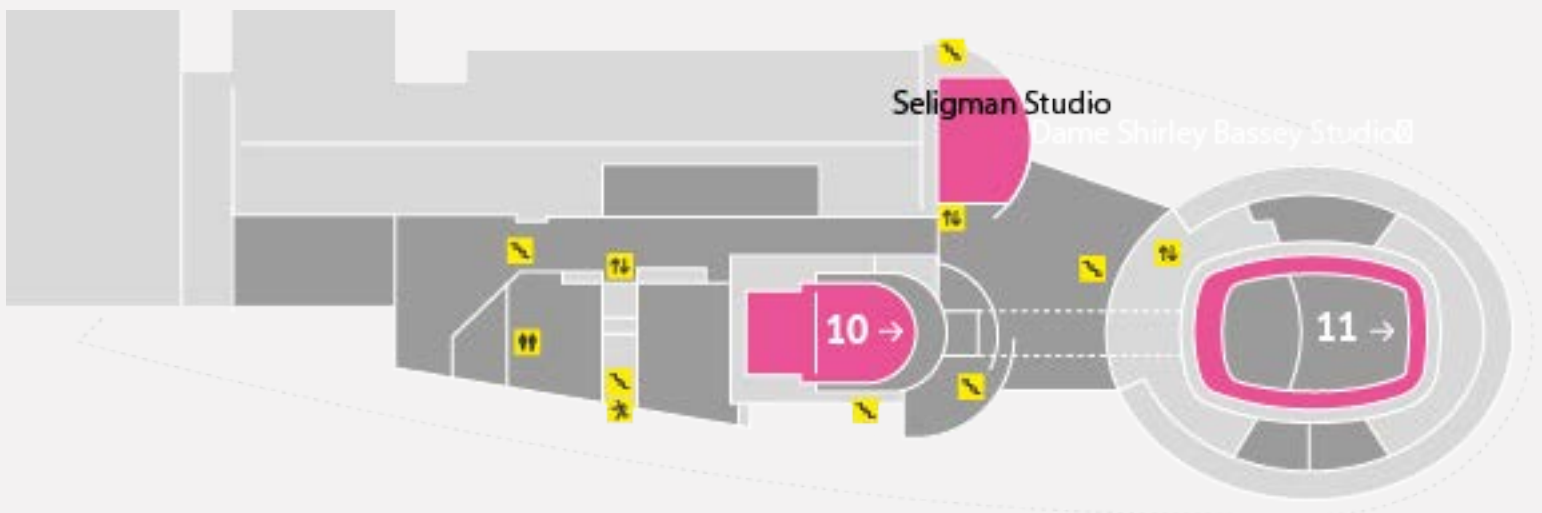

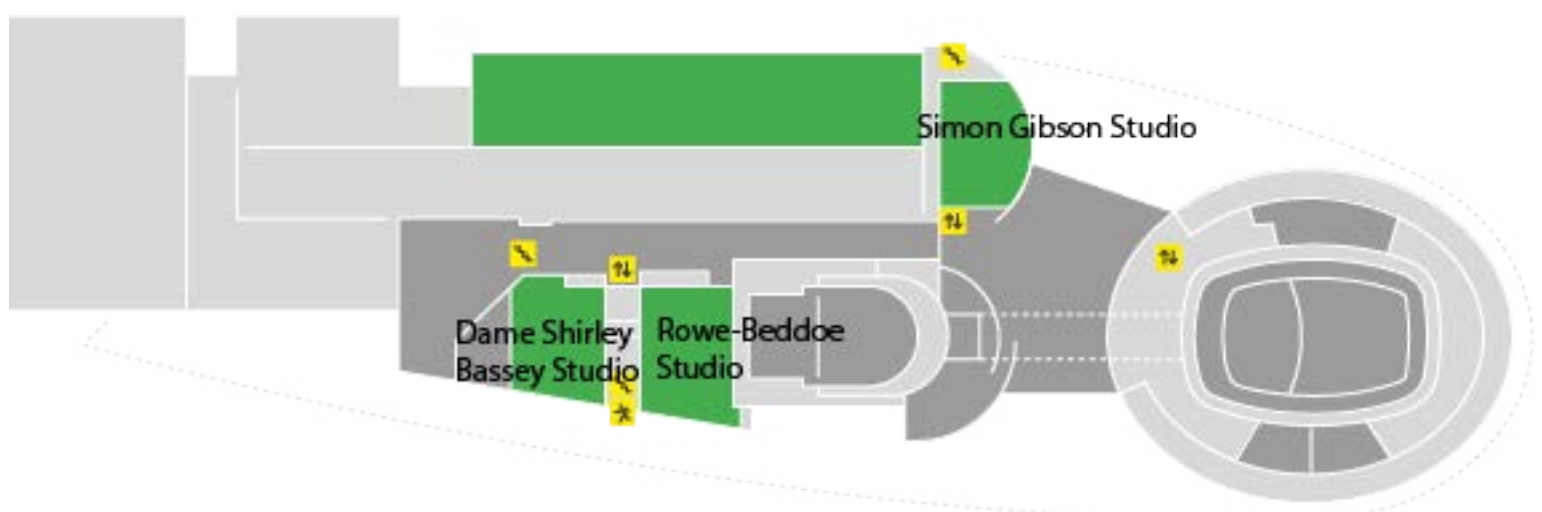
Venue Map
