- Diabetes
- ▶ Dementia completed Virtual Dementia Tour and Level 2 certificate
- ► Medication management

3 years of experience working with Mary, 5 visits a week, 8 hours for each visit adding up to around **5760 hours**

Hospital visit for a CT scan

Margaret

- ▶ 92 years old
- ► Frail
- ▶ Poor balance and high falls risk, mainly down to macular degeneration
- ► BMI 16
- Very poor appetite, choosy with food
- No next of kin
- Severe anxiety

Care workers visits 3 times a day for one hour

Martina - Margaret's care worker

Trained in:

- Mandatory: basic life support, moving and handling people, safeguarding, infection prevention, health and safety, communication, basic nutrition, privacy and dignity
- Nutrition in later life
- Mental health awareness
- Medication management

1 year of experience working with Margaret, 10 visits a week, 1 hour for each visit adding up to around 480 hours

Hospitalisation following a fall at home

Steven

- ▶ 84 years old
- Depression
- Low motivation
- Hip replacement
- No next of kin

Care workers visits once a day for two hours

Luke - Steven's care worker

Trained in:

- Mandatory: basic life support, moving and handling people, safeguarding, infection prevention, health and safety, communication, basic nutrition, privacy and dignity
- Mental health issues in later life
- Challenging behaviour
- Counselling skills

6 months of experience working with Steven, 4 visits a week, 2 hours for each visit adding up to around 190 hours

Discharge and home recovery following a hip replacement

How did care workers help - the summary

- Prevent malnutrition
- Enable tests
- Post-op recovery
- Mood management
- Cut down appointment time
- Conflict management
- Quick discharge
- Communication
- Medication management

Care workers are an extremely valuable resource, which needs to be utilised in geriatric care.
